Mayor Rick called this regular meeting to order at 6:30 p.m. Member's present were Council members Alyssa Bergman, Tonya Stokka, Brad Field, and Don Goedtke. Absent were Council members Dawn Stuvland and Scott Bauer.

12-08-25-01 Motion Bergman, second Goedtke to approve the agenda as presented, with the addition of hiring Clay Danielson, Ella Cossette, and Tessa Aberle as EMT's. Motion carried.

12-08-25-02 Motion Stokka, second Bergman to approve the consent agenda, with the addition of hiring EMT's Clay Danielson, Ella Cossette, and Tessa Aberle. Motion carried.

12-08-25-03 Motion Goedtke, second Stokka to open the public hearing for the truth-in-taxation hearing presentation at 6:40 p.m. Motion carried.

12-08-25-04 Motion Stokka, second Goedtke to close the public hearing for the truth-in-taxation hearing at 6:50 p.m. Motion carried.

12-08-25-05 Motion Field, second Stokka to approve the 2026 levy resolution, upon a roll call vote, motion carried.

12-08-25-06 Motion Bergman, second Stokka to approve the 2026 budget resolution, upon a roll call vote, motion carried.

## Energy Saving Ideas to Save you \$\$\$


<b>TAKE ADVANTAGE OF HEAT FROM THE SUN</b> Open curtains on your south-facing windows during the day to allow sunlight to naturally heat your home, and close them at night to reduce the chill you may feel from cold windows. 	<b>LOWER YOUR HOLIDAY LIGHTING COSTS</b> Use LED holiday light strings to reduce the cost of decorating your home for the winter holidays. 
<b>COVER DRAFTY WINDOWS</b> Use a heavy-duty plastic sheet or clear plastic film on the inside of your window frames during the cold winter months. Make sure the plastic is sealed tightly to the frame to help reduce infiltration. 	<b>ADJUST THE TEMPERATURE</b> When you're home & awake set your thermostat as low as is comfortable. When you are asleep or out of the house, turn your thermostat back 10° to 15° for eight hours and save around 10% a year on your heating and cooling bills. 
<b>REDUCE HEAT LOSS FROM THE FIREPLACE</b> Keep your fireplace damper closed unless a fire is burning. Keeping the damper open is like keeping a window wide open during the winter; it allows warm air to go right up the chimney. If you never use your fireplace, plug and seal the chimney flue. 	<b>FIND AND SEAL LEAKS</b> Seal the air leaks around utility cut-throughs for pipes, gaps around chimneys and recessed lights in insulated ceilings, and unfinished spaces behind cupboards and closets. Add caulk or weatherstripping to seal air leaks around leaky doors and windows. 

## Stop Annoying Telemarketers... Register on the DO NOT CALL List!

You have a choice regarding telemarketing calls. **If your number is listed on the Do Not Call registry, all commercial telemarketers, except for businesses with whom you have an existing relationship or certain non-profit and political organizations, can not call you.**

Register your residential telephone number, including wireless numbers, on the national Do-Not-Call Registry at no cost, either by phone at **(888)382-1222** or for TTY, call **(866) 290-4236**. You must call from the telephone number that you wish to register. You may also register, or obtain additional information, via the Internet at [www.donotcall.gov](http://www.donotcall.gov). Registration will be effective 31 days after registration.

## MUNICIPAL TELEPHONE

# Are you having trouble using the telephone due to a hearing or speech disability?

Minnesota Relay is a free telephone service that uses specially trained communications assistants to facilitate telephone calls between people with hearing and speech disabilities and other individuals. Calls can be made to anywhere in the world, 24 hours a day, 365 days a year. All calls are completely confidential. To make a relay call dial 711. Once connected to the relay service, tell the communications assistant the type of relay call you wish to make. Or you may dial the specific toll-free number for the type of relay service.

### **Captioned Telephone Service (CTS)**

CTS uses a special telephone with a text display screen so that a person who is hard of hearing *can listen to and read captions* of everything the other person on the call says. You speak directly to the other person on the call, and a relay communications assistant transcribes everything the other person says into captions, which appear on the display screen of your CTS phone.

### **Internet Protocol Captioned Telephone Service (IP CTS)**

Internet-based forms of CTS are available for those who would like to use CTS on a computer, tablet, or smartphone. For more information on IP CTS go to [fcc.gov/ipcts](https://fcc.gov/ipcts).

### **Hearing Carry Over (HCO): 1-800-627-3529**

HCO allows a person who can hear clearly but who has very limited or no speech capability to make phone calls. Using a special text telephone, you type your conversation for the relay communications assistant to read to the other person and you listen directly to the other person's response.

### **Hearing User: 1-800-627-3529**

A hearing person may use a standard telephone or mobile phone to place a relay call and speak with a person who is deaf, hard of hearing, or speech disabled.

### **Internet Protocol (IP) Relay**

IP Relay is a text-based form of relay service that uses the internet, rather than a traditional telephone line and TTY, for calls. You can make your relay call using a computer, laptop, tablet, or smartphone. For more information on IP Relay go to [fcc.gov/ip-relay](https://fcc.gov/ip-relay).

### **Spanish Relay: 1-877-627-5448**

A Spanish speaking person with a hearing or speech disability can make relay calls. This is not a translation service – both people must speak Spanish, and at least one person must have a hearing or speech disability.

### **Speech-to-Speech (STS): 1-877-627-3848**

STS allows a person who has difficulty speaking or being understood on the phone to communicate using his or her own voice or voice synthesizer. The communications assistant revoices your words so that the other person on the call can understand them, and the other person speaks directly to you.

### **Text Telephone (TTY): 1-800-627-3529**

This service allows a person who is deaf, deafblind, or speech disabled to use a TTY to communicate with the other person on the call.

### **Video Relay Service (VRS)**

VRS allows a person who uses American Sign Language (ASL) to communicate over the phone. The VRS user connects to the relay communications assistant via an internet-enabled device with a video camera. The communications assistant relays the conversation back and forth between the people on the call – in ASL with the VRS user and by voice with the other person. ### **Voice Carry Over (VCO): 1-877-627-3024**

VCO allows a person with a hearing disability, but who wants to use his or her own voice, to speak directly to the other person on the call. The communications assistant then types the other person's response, which is displayed on the VCO user's text telephone.

### **Emergency Assistance**

TTY callers should dial 911 directly in an emergency. All 911 centers are equipped to handle TTY calls. Minnesota Relay can process emergency calls, but this may delay the response to your call.

## Information Needed

If your eligibility, identity, or address cannot be confirmed automatically, you will need to submit additional documents. Learn how in our [acceptable documentation guide](#).

## One Per Household

Only one Lifeline discount is allowed per household.

A **household** is a group of people who live together and share money.

If you share housing but don't share your money, you and your housemates are considered separate households.
